5 Things You Need to Know

About Medicaid Waiver Programs in Texas

What does "Waiver" mean?

A waiver overrides certain rules for how funding can be used. Waivers "waive" (some rules do not apply) certain requirements for Medicaid. If you meet the eligibility requirements, you can get the services you need in your own home or other community settings to avoid more restrictive settings like nursing homes, institutions, or facilities.

What is a "Medicaid Waiver Program"?

A "Medicaid waiver program" or Long-Term Service and Supports (LTSS) allows the state to be more flexible with how it spends money to provide long-term services to some people with disabilities or the elderly in order to help them live in the community and thrive as independently as possible.

How many LTSS Waiver Programs are there?

There are 7 different LTSS/Medicaid Waiver Programs in Texas: TxHmL, HCS, CLASS, MDCP, DBMD, STAR+PLUS HCBS, and YES. Each program has different rules, qualifications, and funding amounts. It is important to speak with someone who understands the differences or click www.navigatelifetexas.org to learn more.

Do I have to wait to receive services?

The LTSS has extensive interest/wait lists, with some over 15 years long and over 150,000 unduplicated citizens waiting for services. The important first step is to get on the interest list, even if you think you will not need it 15 years from now. You can decline services when your name comes up.
